"...God gave his only begotten son..."

A lot of people think this opinion from John at the end of the first century settles it. "The Bible says so, doesn't it"

The Pilate story moves into the blame game full speed.

Pilate answers to the Roman Emperor using Roman soldiers.

And Jesus himself is blamed for blasphemy punishable by death.

But wait! Also the High Priests and those angry Jews....

So anti-Semitism now has a place to hide itself...in the Passion story...

for over 2000 years... is still smoldering...bursting into crematoriums along the way I'd rather they would let Paul sing a song we sometimes sang at Moment...

"God don't hate the Muslims, God don't hate the Jews, God don't hate the Christians, but we all give God the blues.

Lent is at hand...an invented tradition to lead us to the Passion Story.
