My current reading is John Shelby Spong's most recent book, "Biblical Literalism: A Gentile Heresy" He is a retired Episcopalian Bishop. While his writings can sound off the wall, they are not especially new. His connecting Matthew to Jewish liturgy was new to me. It is the kind of book that speaks to questions that are not talked about in most churches.

New off the press is Bart Ehrman's "Jesus Before the Gospels — How the earliest Christians remembered, changed, and invented their stories." The basic scholarship will not be new to those who keep up on biblical studies.

What is new (at least to me) is his research on memory and how these studies relate to the question of how or if memory plays a part in how accurately the biblical stories have been passed on.
