"And a woman said to him, 'How is it that you, a Jew, ask a drink of me, a woman of Samaria?"

I put my hand on his shoulder and turned to the back of the chapel...

"See those doors ...?"

I said: "As pastor of my church I welcomed all who came...

"I didn't know what political party they followed...

whether they were gay or lesbian...

whether they believed the bible literally or not...

whether they believed in God or were atheists...

"If they came in the Church doors ...

I could not turn myself away from those whom Jesus welcomed...

I was their pastor."

He listened to me soberly and said

"I hear you."

I could have cited all the anecdotal gospel places

where Jesus welcomed, blessed, healed, forgave and loved sick, mentally isolated, unbelievers, tax collectors, partiers

adulterers, untouchables, and outsiders...

even a Samaritan woman.

Churches tend toward partisanship...welcoming their "base"...

sometimes ridiculing, rejecting and dismissing those who differ...

"bible believing" from other bible believers...

fundamentalists from liberals...

whites from non-whites...

Survivalism is the abiding principle of many congregations...

the pastoral Dilemma is whether to serve only a supportive base

or to serve without regard to support or agreement.

Our local Corvallis Rabbi pastors a widely diverse Jewish community...

Orthodox, Conservative and Reform...sometimes militant opposites...

yet they thrive locally as a Jewish Community.

Orthodox read the Torah strictly and literally...that's OK...

Conservatives read the Torah historically and critically...that's OK too...

Reform respect the Torah and even understanding it mystically.

He is Rabbi to all...respecting the different understandings.

at year's end the diverse community

literally dances around the Torah together.

I believe some jobs call us to serve more than ourselves...

and to serve more than our supportive base...

a Dilemma faced by Pastors and Presidents alike.
